President Wilson, Secretary Tumulty and Secretary Mc Adoo, All With Summer Residences Here, Interested In Situation. Three U. S. Departments Now Cooperating---Cutter May Patrol Coast.

With President Wilson, Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and the president's secretary, Joseph P. Coast Guards May Aid. WASHINGTON. July 15.—Tragic stories of attacks by sharks upon bathers along the New Jersey coast were discussed at restorday's meeting of the cablest.

Later William G. McAdos, secretary of the irresury, announced that the coast guard service would be ordered to do what it could toward clearing the coast of the dirigerous fish, and preventing further loss of life.

Instructions were sent by the treasury department both to the coast guard cutters and life saving stations. No definite plan of action has been worked out, but the idea is to have the service aid in locating and killing sharks and when possible wars resorts of their proximity.

William C. Reddeld, secretary of commerce told his enhinet that the bureau of deheries had been unable to offer any scientific explanation of the unprecedenced altacks upon human beings.

A resolution was introduced in the house yesterday by Representative Rischarach of New Jersey, authorizing department of commerce to contently with since authorities in an effort to exterminate the sharks, and appropriating 15,000 for the purpose."

This would serve the double purpose of calching the predictory fleb and of siving variable of their processo in a particular locality,

There are always a few sharks of the cost, particularly in stimper, but the resent deplorable tragedies are entirely unprecodented in insuperate woters, althor the bureau hos has reliable reports of shuffar geourrences in the tropics.

These are no "man-chiers" in the sense of implying exclusive or communnitilation to a dist of pumpar fields The shurks are a whole pro-promission flesh entern, living particularly in live flesh, but ready to out any animal maiter, dead or allow. Under sizes of hunger they become quite hold, and while it is impossible to make a posttive statement to that offent, is is probable that a few individuals, tomporariby depixed of their ordinary food, have been driven by sizes of elecuratarices to attack user which arithmetic they would avoid.

While the recent tragedies are anpulling from their very puttice and hisspire units in their and herer's by coaset of their unexpectedness and the fermity of the attacks, they are few is number compared with the vest army of bathers. ITTUES OF THOMA WHO WAW TH Shark Gaught in Bluefish Net.

The biggeot shark caught yesterday was one measuring usere than eight feet and weighing 201 hounds which was taken by Captain Paul Terriev and a crow of three men after a long struggle about a mile off Beford, N. J. The abark had followed a school of bluefish frite the net and not himself enmeshed by the time the fishermen began to haultn. The fish thrashel furtoursty, but was stunned with chilts and boathooks and finally lifted into the boat. Twelve small shatts were found in the stormach. The shark was of a bittish color with a walte belly, the type issually found in these waters.
