Capt. Everingham Hits In. der With Oar at Asbury Avenue---Group Is Closed, Bathing Being Allowed Only at Steel Enclosed Fourth Ave. Grounds.

The shark scare in Asbury Park has become a reality. A shark helieved to have been about 12 feet long was encountered by Life Guard Capitain Ben-jumin Everingham in a surf boat with-in 50 fect of the outer ropes at the Asbury avenue bathing grounds at 11.45 o'clock this morning. Everingham struck at the big fish twice, with his oar, and with a swirling of the waters the shark turned and shot out to sea. A few minutes later Everingham returned to the bench and told his slory. Orders were immediately given to clear the surf of bathers, and no more tickets were sold at the Asbury avenue group.

Because of the shark menace bathing is now permitted at only the Fourth elosed with heavy mesh wire.

Everingham was patrolling the bathing grounds a short distance beyond the ropes when he sighted the shark headed directly for the boat. He lifted one of the oars from its lock and struck viciously at the slimy back of the sea monster. Everingham declares he struck the shark, and as it turned to head out to sea, he struck it again. The car was the only weapon he had in the boat, despite the hellef that all the patrolling boats had been equipped with rifles and axes.

Persons on the shore and along the south side of the fishing pier saw Everingham striking the water with his car and were puzzled over his actions until they learned that he had seen a shark.

Considerable excitement prevailed after Everingham's announcement, and it did not require much urging from the guards to clear the water of the bathers. There were about 100 per-sons bathing at the Asbury avenue grounds at the time.

Everingham declares the shark appeared to be as long as the boat. He believes that, had he been armed with an axe or harpoon he might have succeeded in wounding or killing the shark.

Stretching of the protecting network of wire about the Fourth avenue grounds was about completed this atternoon. As soon as the placing of this barrier is finished men engaged on the job will start on the other grounds, which will be responed as fast as they are completed.

Reassured by the patroling life loats, which were rowed up and down the coast out a short distance beyond the ropes enclosing the outer end of the Fourth avenue bathing grounds, a big growd of bathers spent the morning in the surf there, but there was an apparent disposition to keep within the lines. There is a motor bout patrol at Fourth avenue.

Sharks have how become a sub-ject of general conversation in a along the coast. Expert opinion has been freely offered, and much of it has been contradictory and largely related to fiction rather than fact. Despite re-ports of schools of sharks having been seen, it is declared a scientific fact that man-cating shorks do not travel in schools. No sharks have been seen off the Laughlin R. Hetrick, proprietor of the fishing yacht Tuna, says that schools of the basking blue variety have been seen far out from the deck of the Tuna. None of them have been seen near the shore, however.

There is considerable speculation here today as to whother it was really a shark that attacked Charles Bruder at Spring Lake. Ophnion is markedly varied, some holding that the lish may have been a glant mackerel or a swordtish.

Bruder Funeral Held.

SPRING LAKE, July 8 .- The funeral of Charles Bruder, who was killed by a shark Thursday afternoon while swimming about 400 yards off the beach here, was held this morning at 10.30 from St. Andrew's Methodist church. Burlal was made at Atlantic View cometery, Manasquan, the ex-penses being borne by the management of the Essex and Sussox hotel, where he was a bollboy. Efforts are now being made to locate his mother in Switzerland, whose sole support the bey was. The hotel management has communicated with the Swiss consul at Philadelphia. In the meantime a fund of \$1,000 is to be raised to be forwarded to her. Another son is in the army and therefore is unable to support his mother
